

TANF CASELOADS FALL AGAIN IN THE SECOND QUARTER OF 2010

TANF caseloads declined in the second quarter of 2010 as they had in the first quarter. ¹ Cumulatively, over these two quarters caseloads fell in thirty five states and the national caseload decreased by 1.8%, falling from 1,931,819 families in December 2009 to 1,896,278 families in June 2010. ²

The reasons for the TANF caseload decline in the first half of 2010 can not be known for certain based on the currently available information. However, over this same six month period the national Food Stamp caseload increased by 7%. The increased Food Stamp participation suggests that the decreased TANF participation was not due to decreased need. 4

The number of children receiving TANF in June 2010 (3,393,372) was but 22% of the number of children reported as being poor in 2009 (15,451,000) in the recently released U.S. Census Bureau report.⁵ Since the beginning of the 'Great Recession' in December 2007, the Food Stamp caseload has increased 55% but the TANF caseload only 11%.
